> Main Jail Entrance Inmate Visitation



Late February

- Planning began with County government
- Wellpath HSA included in all discussions

March

- 3/10 First known positive in Michigan
- 3/11
 - Extra cleaning and sanitizing instruction memo
 - Ordered additional cleaning supplies to ramp up inventory
 - Increased usage of UV sanitizer
- 3/13
 - limit outside personnel from entering the building
 - Professional visits moved to video visitation in lobby or online
 - Family video visits only. Allowed for additional free online visit
- 3/18
 - Initiated new arrest screenings





March (cont.)

3/24

- New workflow for male new arrests
 - No longer held in main jail holding tanks
 - Cell size ranged from 13 38 people in one cell
 - All housed in direct supervision housing
 - Two to a cell (32 cells in one housing pod)
 - Remain in direct supervision area for 14 days to determine if symptoms show prior to assigning to general population
- Daily new arrest processing dropped from 60+ /day to 10–15/day
- Secured some test kits through Oakland County Health Department

3/28

- First COVID-19 positive inmate was confirmed
- Initially the inmate was housed in our jail clinic for a couple of days
- Many normal operations were cancelled until further notice: Recreation, AA / NA Programs, Commissary ordering and delivery





<u>April</u>

4/1

- Added temperature taking with the screening of new arrests
- Thermometers on back order
- Obtained quite a few level one masks. Gave one to every inmate and would give another when needed

4/2

- As more inmates tested positive a different direct supervision housing area was designated as a COVID-19 positive pod
- With our jail population decreasing we were also able to designate another direct supervision pod as a symptomatic pod.
- The process had become identify, test and isolate.
- Symptomatic patients (based on Wellpath diagnosis and recommendation) moved from housing area to symptomatic housing area awaiting test results





April (continued)

Positive patients

- transferred to the COVID-19 positive direct supervision area
- "back-tracked" housing assignments to determine if anyone else needed to be tested or if any specific areas needed to be quarantined

• PPE

- Inventory built up over time. We had a few N95 masks to start so we were issuing as necessary
- After ample supplies came in we issued what we could
- Purchased UV sterilizer machines throughout facilities to use with N95 masks
- Ordered 5,000 cloth masks to "upgrade" masks given to all inmates
- Issued clear face shields to every deputy assigned to corrections divisions
- Positive inmates had N95 masks available when out of cell





Cases

- Highest number of positive inmates at one time: 31 on 04/16
- Current cases: 9 as of 04/27
- Hoping to maintain low numbers with current processes

Decision Making

• We did our best to let medical decisions guide the way and managed the custody and security issues within that guidance


Recommended Masking Strategy

- All new intakes should be issued surgical masks and quarantined for 14-days before being moved to general population, until further guidance is provided.
- All corrections staff and Wellpath staff should wear masks in all situations where others are present, until further guidance is provided.
- All patients at high-risk of adverse outcomes from COVID-19 should wear N-95 or KN-95 respirators, until further guidance is provided.
- For at least the next two weeks, all inmates/detainees should wear masks in all situations where others are present.

Medical Categories for Respirator Consideration


All patients medically determined to be at high risk of adverse outcomes from COVID-19:

- > 65 years
- BMI > 40
- Advanced liver disease
- Dialysis
- Cancer
- Unstable diabetes
- Unstable hypertension/Coronary Disease
- Unstable COPD



Onsite Mask Production

- March 2020
 - Inmate Education DVD videos for inmates regarding influenza and Coronavirus / COVID 19 (Hand washing and Respiratory/ Coughing Hygiene)
- April 2020
 - <u>Mandatory</u>: All personnel working within PBSO Correction Facilities will wear a mask at all times
 - Temperature checks for all inmates was established
 - o Sewing Department
 - Four thousand mask were made over a 14-day time period
 - 8-hour day
 - Mattress covering program was converted for the purpose of inmate mask
